## USU's Intermountain Herbarium Benefits from Unique Partnership

A chance encounter with Utah State University's Intermountain Herbarium allowed USU alum, Sara Lamb, to indulge her fascination with rare and endangered plants, while creating an enriching opportunity for fledgling lab technicians to contribute to university research.



In a unique partnership forged with the herbarium in fall 2012, Lamb is leading a group of inmates at eastern Utah's Daggett County Jail in preparing and cataloguing a collection of more than 4,000 plant and seed specimens for the herbarium's collections. "This is a classic 'win-win' situation for everyone involved," says Lamb, who teaches in the Daggett County School District's GED preparation and adult education program. "It allows the herbarium to make use of a valuable collection and provide students and faculty with expanded learning and research opportunities, and it affords a group of inmates the opportunity to learn new skills, gain self-confidence and contribute to society."

Lamb became acquainted with Mary Barkworth, herbarium director, and Michael Piep, assistant curator, while attending a USU Extension Master Gardeners' event at Cache Valley's American West Heritage Center in fall 2011. "I noticed the herbarium's exhibit and I was intrigued," she says. "Mary, Michael and I hit it off immediately. I later made visits to the herbarium and learned how to mount specimens and do data entry."

Around that time, the herbarium received an intriguing donation offer. Tim and Sally Walker, who were retiring from their seed business in Arizona, offered to give USU their collection of dried plants and seeds gathered over decades from throughout the United States and Mexico. "Some of these specimens are more than half a century old and they include families of specimens we haven't had in our collection before," Barkworth says. "So, we jumped at the chance to expand our holdings and better support research in any part of the United States and northwestern Mexico." What Barkworth didn't realize until the collection arrived in Logan is many of the specimens were mounted on non-archival, larger-than-standard size paper. "This presented a dilemma because it meant more labor was involved than we anticipated," she says. "Rather than cataloguing and imaging the specimens, importing the information to our database and virtual herbarium and storing the specimens, we realized we were going to have to either cut the mountings to standard size or remount them." The process, she says, is painstaking and time-consuming. The dried plants must be handled carefully to prevent damage. "At the standard rate we pay our student technicians, it would have been cost-prohibitive to process a collection of this size," Barkworth says. Lamb, who heard about the processing challenge, suggested employing some of her students at the jail.

# MANILA FFA CHAPTER ATTENDS STATE CONVENTION

Members of the Manila FFA Chapter attended the Utah State FFA Convention March 13-15, at the Sevier Valley Center in Richfield. Members participated in many contests and events while at the convention.

Among the highlights of the convention was the selection of McKayla Gonder as the Utah FFA State Secretary for 2013-14, and Ross Slagowski placing second in the State Creed Speaking Contest. AJ Olsen was also named the recipient of the \$1500 Western AgCredit/IFA Scholarship.

Emily Catron was named the 1<sup>st</sup> Runner-up to the Star State FFA Degree in Agribusiness. She received a plaque and a check for \$150. AJ Olsen was named the 2<sup>nd</sup> Runner-up to Star State Degree in Production, and McKayla Gonder was named the third runner-up to the Star State Degree in Agri-science. Other members receiving State FFA Degree were Rustyn Burnside, Janell Reed and Aubree Thomas.

Chapter members won eight state proficiency awards. Winners included: Aubree Thomas, in Agricultural Communications, Kaylee Hughes in Agricultural Mechanics, Repair and Maintenance, McKayla Gonder in Agricultural Services, Tyler Asay in Beef Production Placement, Emily Catron, in Landscape Management; Darellyn Hughes, in Outdoor Recreation; AJ Olsen, in Sheep Production; and Matt Northcott, in Turf grass Management. Each award winner received a plaque, a check for \$250, a gift certificate to IFA Country Stores and the right to compete at the National FFA Convention.

In Star State Greenhand competitions, JD Slagowski was the First Runner-up in Production. He received a plaque and cash award.

In the Agri-science Fair competition, placing first was Bailee Thomas in Food Systems; placing second was Mat Gonder in Power and Technical Systems. Ross Slagowski and Trevor Sadlier placed third in Power and Technical Systems and Daphne Slagowski and Anna Marie Henry in Animal Systems.

Tyler Asay, Jenessa Gosar, Darellyn Hughes and Kaylee Hughes were also recognized as American FFA Degree candidates.

In other contests, Aubree Thomas was a finalist in the Job Interview career development event and competed in the Extemporaneous Public Speaking Contest. The Parliamentary Procedure team also participated in the state contest. Members included AJ Olsen, McKayla

## Commissioners' Corner

The Legislature finished all issues regarding the county jails in record time, with 9 hours to spare. The County Governments came out Ok! The Legislature appropriated an additional \$1 million in one-time money toward jail contracting, with an additional \$380,000 towards jail programming, and another \$1 million for jail reimbursements. The Legislature passed HCR 5 which recognizes regional correctional facilities and county jail contracting as alternatives to address the prison relocation. And on the prison relocation front, the Legislature passed a version of SB 72 which doesn't allow a permit to a private prison or for private administration of the prison. The Utah Association of Counties thanks Daggett County, and all of the counties that worked tirelessly on these issues.

The Vernal Ranger District is seeking your input on two proposed reroutes and two seasonal road and trail closures. One proposed reroute is located in Greens Draw on Forest Road 49 (FR49), with the seasonal closures affecting FR 49 and Forest Trails 003 and 004 (FT 003, FT 004). The second proposed reroute is located in the Bowden Draw on Forest Road 177 (FR 177), with the second seasonal closure affecting FR177 and Forest Trail 008 (FT008) This letter provides you with information on the purpose of and need for the project and the proposed action. It also supplies information on how and where to submit your comments regarding the proposal.

We are accepting public comments on this proposal. Comments would be most useful if received within 30 days of publication (expected on March 13, 2013) of the legal notice of this Proposal in the Vernal Express. Comments should be specific to this project, have a direct relationship to the proposed action, and include supporting information that the Responsible Official should consider in reaching a decision. This comment period provides those interested in or affected by this proposal an opportunity to make their concerns known prior to a decision being made by the Responsible Official.

A federal judge handed a landmark victory to Kane County and the state of Utah on Wednesday in a years-long dispute with the federal government over whether some rural routes should remain in use as roads, or if they should be closed to the public. In two decisions, U.S. District Judge Clark Waddoups found he had jurisdiction to hear Kane County's claim, gave parameters for "reasonable" right-of-way widths on some routes and determined that 12 of 15 routes in dispute were roads and therefore accessible by the public. The distinction hinged on an 1866 law through which Congress sought to encourage development by allowing local jurisdictions to manage routes across public land; the law was repealed in 1976 by Revised Statute 2477. With the revision, Congress retained most remaining public lands and created the Bureau of Land Management. Preexisting claims, however, were grandfathered in and considered valid as long as entities moved to claim them within a 12 year time frame. Waddoups determined that Kane County did so. Kane County Commission Chairman Doug Heaton said Thursday the ruling vindicates the county in its fight to continue to travel what he described as historic thoroughfares. "We're confident the judge took great pains to get it right," he said. "We're excited the court has ruled in our favor." Daggett County sees this as huge victory in our local efforts with our own RS2477 roads.

“Inmates are allowed to work for a modest wage that is kept in an account they can use for purchases at the jail’s commissary,” she says. “We approached the Sheriff’s Office with a proposal, supported by a private donation to cover wages, and it was readily approved.” Working as an herbarium technician is considered a privilege, Lamb says. “Our students enjoy the work, which includes learning how to mount the specimens, adding each specimen’s scientific name and entering the information into a database,” she says. “It also gives them the opportunity to earn pocket money for purchases of treats and personal items. This is an important psychological boost; particularly for those inmates who have no financial support from family or friends.” Lamb says the students also take pride in contributing to university research. “They understand their efforts in adding these specimens to the herbarium’s collections will benefit not only USU student and faculty researchers but all users of the U.S. Virtual Herbarium [<http://uaes.usu.edu/htm/aes-news/us-virtual-herbarium-online/>], of which the Intermountain Herbarium is a part,” she says.



Daggett County Sheriff Jerry Jorgensen is pleased with the project and is working with Lamb and Barkworth on other ideas to involve inmates, including a planned hoop house project to grow vegetables for the jail’s cafeteria. Lamb says one of her students has expressed interest in pursuing studies at USU in the future. “That’s a big thing,” she says. “Our hope for these students is they’ll find purpose and direction. To see them turning their lives around is inspiring.”



## UPSTART: An Easy and Effective Way to Prepare Your Child for School

UPSTART (*Utah Preparing Students Today for a Rewarding Tomorrow*) is an in-home school readiness program created by Salt Lake City based Waterford Institute, a non-profit research institute focused on early childhood education for over 35 years. UPSTART uses three of Waterford's award-winning early education software, to provide children with an individualized reading, math, and science curriculum with a focus on reading instruction. The program requires a commitment of 15 minutes a day, 5 days a week.

Utah is the largest application of the UPSTART model with more than 5,500 children to date who have benefitted from participation. ## Cedar Hollow Lateral Piping Project Underway

March 2013

The Sheep Creek Irrigation Company has initiated a project to pipe its Cedar Hollow Lateral. The project proposes installation of approximately five miles of irrigation pipe in the existing open canal channel. A portion of the canal to be piped runs through the Town of Manila. The pipe will be installed within the same alignment and right-of-way as the existing open canal.



The project team is evaluating potential impacts to land adjacent to the canal, which include possible disruptions to landscaping and other vertical obstructions within the irrigation company's easement (approximately 30'-40' wide). The new pipeline will be buried. The project team will work with individual property owners to minimize impacts as much as possible.

Residents may notice surveyors, engineers and environmental specialists within the canal corridor starting in early March. They will be performing work required to complete the environmental and design clearances. Construction is anticipated to begin in October 2013 and continue through the winter.

### Anticipated Project Benefits Include:

- The elimination of open water which can be a safety hazard.
- A significant reduction in maintenance activities required by the canal company (cleaning, vegetation and debris removal within the canal easement, monitoring, etc.).
- A reduction in weeds which grow as a result of the canal.
- Reduced flooding potential from irrigation water overtopping the canal banks.
- Water conservation as less irrigation water will be lost to evaporation and seepage.
- Salinity control as piping the canal will reduce the mobilization and transport of dissolved salts in the soil that result from ditch seepage.

### Viola A. Messenger

Viola A. Messenger left this mortal existence on March 17, 2013. She was preceded in death by her husband, Clarence V. Messenger, who was killed in an auto incident in 2003. She is survived by three children, Linda Blanchard, Barbara Messenger, and Joan Lawson. She leaves behind 9 grandchildren and 23 great grandchildren and 3 GG grandchildren.

Viola was born January 16, 1924 as Viola Adeline Anderson in Washington, Iowa. She married Clarence Vernon Messenger in 1946 after he returned from serving in WWII. They made their home in Washington, Iowa where they started their family. They moved to Rangely, Colorado in 1956 where they resided until 1966 when Clarence took a job with the Bureau of Reclamation. During her life time, Viola also has lived in Chamberlain, South Dakota; Green Mountain, Colorado; Prosser, Washington;

Kennewick, Washington; Yuma, Arizona; Dutch John, Utah; Grand Junction, Colorado; and her final home was in Colorado Springs, Colorado where she lived close to her daughter Joan, grandson Chad, and her granddaughter, Lora.

Viola and Clarence moved to Dutch John, Utah in 1978 where she became active in the community and made many friends. Viola loved deer and rabbit hunting. 
