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**Ned Brady**  
**selected for**  
**2014 Golden Shovel Award for**  
**Daggett County**



Ned was born and raised in the neighboring community of McKinnon, Wyoming. In 1969, after the family ranch was sold, Ned's family moved to Green River, Wyoming.

He lived and worked outside of Utah until 1990 when he and his wife, Juleen, moved back to Manila. They wanted five acres to put a home on. They ended up acquiring three small ranches and in 1991 became shareholders in the Sheep Creek Canal Company.

In 2005 Ned was elected as President of the Sheep Creek Canal Company. His first undertaking was to have the valley re-surveyed to determine the total acreage of irrigated lands under the Sheep Creek Canal system. The canal services almost 10,000 acres.

Ned has overseen the operations of the canal company for nine years, including securing grants to pipe the four laterals serving local shareholders. Under Ned's persistence, the two laterals that have received funding are the Cedar Hollow Lateral and the South Valley Lateral. However, he gives credit to the other board members for the canal company's successes.

The South Valley lateral will be a four year project and the Cedar Hollow lateral is projected to be completed by June 2014.

Serving on the Board has been a learning experience, Ned will tell you that the biggest eye opener for him has been over Utah water laws.

Not only does Ned dedicate countless hours to the Sheep Creek Canal Company he has also served as the Daggett County Weed Manager for the last two years. He is instrumental in saving the weed program in Daggett County.

Ned Brady has been selected to receive the Golden Shovel Award for his commitment to the land and water in Daggett county and by the time he oversees the completion of the ongoing pipeline projects he will probably deserve a second award. Thank you, Ned Brady.

## Utah's Bald Eagle Day Set for February 8th

Since it began in 1990, Bald Eagle Day has become one of Utah's most popular wildlife viewing events.

Viewing will take place from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.. Plenty of eagles should be available to see at most of the state's Bald Eagle Day viewing sites. The 24th annual event for the Northeastern Region will be held at **Split Mountain/Green River**, located north of Jensen and below the Dinosaur Quarry in Dinosaur National Monument (DNM).

To reach the site, drive north from U.S. Highway 40 in Jensen on the road (state Route 149) to the Dinosaur Quarry.

Stop at the staging area located just inside the Dinosaur National Monument boundary. Biologists, with displays and spotting scopes, will be available to introduce visitors to bald eagles and other local wildlife. Bald eagles and other raptors should be able to be seen in the distance from the staging area.

Bald Eagle Day will be held Feb. 8 at five viewing sites across the state.

A live bird of prey will be available to see close up! At least one hawk will be on display at the staging area for part of the day. Melissa Wardel, a local falconer usually brings her bird to the staging area in mid-morning. The hawk will remain on display until it decides it no longer wants to tolerate the crowds. This year Melissa is also planning to do a one-hour slide show on birds of prey at the new visitor center beginning at noon.

From the staging area, biologists will direct visitors to other sites where they may have better views of eagles and other wildlife of interest. In past years, visitors have seen bald and golden eagles hunting and feeding, as well as prairie falcons, hawks, mule deer, river otters, pheasants, turkeys, sandhill cranes, porcupines, mergansers, Canada geese and other wildlife.



During their trip, visitors are invited to stop and see the dinosaur bones and exhibits at Dinosaur National Monument. The Dinosaur Quarry and the new visitor center are open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The visitor center also includes a small bookstore and warm bathrooms.

## Kid's Ice Fishing Clinic at the Moose Pond

Utah Division of Wildlife Resources (UDWR) and Trout Unlimited (TU) hosted the 2nd Annual Youth Ice Fishing Clinic at Moose Pond on January 11th. The event was advertised through Daggett County public schools and about 30 kids attended, along with their parents and/or grandparents. About 75% of the kids had never ice fished before, and a portion of those had never even fished! Bait, tackle, and loaner rods were made available, so kids just had to show-up.

About 350 14-inch rainbow trout were stocked in late fall, to provide additional quarry for the

young anglers. To supplement those, a few 17-18 inch brood fish were also stocked to put some extra "bend" in a few lucky rods. The event started with a brief introduction to ice fishing and a refresher on ice safety by DWR staff. After that, there was a raffle to give away a horde of prizes donated by generous supporters, including: Flaming Gorge Market, Flaming Gorge Resort, TU and DWR. Donations included tackle, ice fishing combos, a fly-tying kit, and an Eskimo hand auger. Following the raffle, kids geared up, hit the ice, and immediately started catching fish. On-the-ice mentoring by DWR and TU staff continued for the next few hours until everyone caught a fish. Hot drinks and snacks kept everyone energized, and DWR staff also fried up about 8-pounds of

fillets so the kids could try the savory taste of fresh fish.

The ultimate goal of these events is to get kids and their families out enjoying a great winter activity- ice fishing and to experience the reward of catching a fish. Many kids were asking, "Can we do this again next weekend?" Those comments and the smiles on their faces say it all.

Thanks again to Flaming Gorge Market, Flaming Gorge Resort, and TU for all their donations which help make this event so successful.

## Red Wing Shoes Recalls Steel Toe Work Boots Due to Impact Hazard

About 105,000 pairs of steel toed work boots have been recalled in the United States and 9,000 in Canada. This recall involves Red Wing stores and other shoe stores from December 2012 through November 2013 for work boots between \$185 and \$340. 45 styles of Red Wing men's steel toe work boots in sizes 11 to 18 and widths ranging from B to H depending on the size

and style. The boots have 6, 8, 10 or 11 inch ankle height and were sold in brown, black and maroon-colored leather. The following style numbers are included in the recall: 2206, 2211, 2223, 2226, 2230, 2238, 2249, 2254, 2270, 2404, 2405, 2406, 2408, 2412, 2414, 2426, 2491, 3505, 3507, 3508, 3526, 3528, 3568, 4208, 4210, 4273, 4406, 4414, 4425, 4433, 4435, 4436, 4437, 4438, 4445, 4481, 4483, 4484, 4494, 22406, 22408, 52406, 52408, 82406 and 82408. Date codes between 12/12 and 11/13 are included in the recall. The style number, date code and Red Wing Shoes are printed on a label inside the boot's tongue. For the complete list, see the firm's website.

## Utah Child Protection Registry

Kids these days are growing up in an online world. Children as young as two are using tablets, mobile phones and computers. 93% of teens (12-17) are online and 63% of teen internet users are online every day. The online world is changing quickly and parents are struggling to keep up on what their kids are doing and who they are talking to. And to make matters worse 67% of teenagers say they know how to hide what they do online from parents.

So what can parents do to limit the negative messages their children are exposed to online?

This is where [Utah's Child Protection Registry](https://donotcontact.utah.gov) comes in. In 2005, the Utah State legislature voted to create a registry where parents can register their email addresses, cell phone numbers and instant messenger ID's to block adult advertising from targeting their family's inboxes. Companies marketing products and services such as alcohol, tobacco, pornography, online gambling and illegal drugs will not be able to send their advertisements to those Utahns who have opted out of such messages. Current spam filters direct this kind of content to a folder in your inbox while the Utah Child Protection Registry prevents you from ever receiving them in the first place.

Here's what you do- log onto <https://donotcontact.utah.gov> register the email addresses and cell phone numbers you want to protect and that's it! The service is fast, easy and best of all completely FREE.

The Registry will not solve all of the problems faced by parents, but it will give families one extra layer of protection from harmful enticements. In an online world that is swiftly moving, isn't nice to know that at least your emails and cell phones are protected?

If you are worried about what your children are exposed to online you should check out the [Utah Child Protection Registry](https://donotcontact.utah.gov). This is a free program provided by the State of Utah that helps you stop adult-oriented marketing like pornography, alcohol, tobacco, illegal drugs, and gambling from being targeted at you and your family. The program allows you to protect:

- E-Mail Addresses
- Mobile Phone Numbers
- Instant Messenger IDs

Companies and marketers that send adult-oriented messages are required to screen their mailing lists with the State of Utah and remove registered addresses and numbers before they send their advertisements. ## Bighorns Return to Goslin Mountain

On the morning of Jan. 30, a small herd of 23 Rocky Mountain bighorn sheep were released at Dripping Springs. Dripping Springs is at the base of Goslin Mountain, between Dutch John and Little Hole in northeastern Utah. The herd includes 13 ewes, five lambs and five rams. The bighorns were captured earlier that week in Desolation Canyon near Green River, Utah. The sheep were then moved to begin a new herd on Goslin Mountain.

**This marks the second time a herd has been reintroduced into the area.**

About 40 years ago, biologists with the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources (UDWR), the U.S. Forest Service (USFS) and the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) began enhancing range along the Goslin Mountain/Green River corridor so Rocky Mountain bighorn sheep could be reintroduced to the area.

In 2001, the range enhancement was given a big boon when a fire near Dutch John cleared away large expanses of pinion-juniper trees. Following the fire, the UDWR and the USFS were able to reseed much of the burned areas in preparation for the bighorn sheep reintroduction.

The first attempt to start a herd on Goslin Mountain began in December 2004. The new herd was supplemented in January 2007 with bighorns captured in Montana.



Unfortunately, after a quick growth spurt between 2004 and 2007, recruitment leveled off, and then the herd started to lose numbers. In February 2008, biologists learned why. The biologists observed several animals coughing, so they tested them for disease. They learned the herd was dying from bacterial pneumonia. To prevent the disease from spreading to other bighorn sheep populations in the area, biologists made the tough decision to eliminate the entire herd. "Their intervention worked, as the nearby herds did not catch the disease," says Ron Stewart, regional conservation outreach manager for the UDWR.

In 2013, UDWR biologists noted that several bighorn sheep herds in Utah were doing extremely well. In fact, the herds were doing so well that some of them had a surplus of animals. Biologists reviewed potential supplemental and new reintroduction sites. Goslin Mountain again rated high as a potential site to start a new herd.

### Recent capture

UDWR biologists hired helicopter crews to capture animals from the herds near the Green River in Desolation/Greys Canyons. After capture crews brought the sheep out of the canyons, biologists gave the bighorns health checks and fitted them with ear tags. Some of the sheep were also fitted with tracking collars before being loaded onto modified horse trailers for their trip north. "It's good to see bighorns on the mountain again," Dax Mangus, a UDWR biologist in northeastern Utah, said as the captured bighorns were released. "Hopefully, the capture team can catch a few more to bring up later this week." Dan Abeyta, a USFS biologist, agreed. "I've got my fingers crossed that these [sheep] will do better than the previous herd."
