Rowdy is making an excellent gesture of trying to keep the public informed.

The public hearing for the feasibility study for the incorporation of Dutch John was held on May 16th in Dutch John. The election for incorporation will occur during the General Election in November.

Washington Versus the People: The Solution to Today's Land War By Steven F. Hayward

The controversy between the federal government and Nevada rancher Cliven Bundy appears to have receded from the front pages for the moment, but it is useful to step back and ask a simple question: how come these highly charged political standoffs seldom if ever occur in New York, or Pennsylvania, or Indiana? How come there is no “Cornbelt Rebellion” to match up with the west’s “Sagebrush Rebellion”?

The answer is simple: the federal government owns very little of the land in the eastern United States. Except for a few national parks and military bases, virtually all of the land east of the Mississippi River is privately owned, and while private land everywhere is subject to numerous regulations, private owners don’t have to ask permission or obtains leases from federal government bureaucrats to use their land. This is one reason the natural gas boom has occurred so rapidly in Pennsylvania and Texas, while gas production continues to lag on federal land out west.

The federal government owns less than 1 percent of the land of New York (ditto for Iowa); only 2.5 percent of Pennsylvania, and 9.9 percent of Virginia. The largest federal landholding by share is New Hampshire, where the feds own 13.4 percent of the land. Contrast this with the western and Rocky Mountain states, where the federal government often owns half or more of the total land area. The feds own 61.9 percent of Alaska, 45.3 percent of California, 57 percent of Utah, and 84.5 percent of Nevada. (The only western state where the federal government owns little land is Texas, at 1.9 percent—a fact that is probably a major factor in Texas’s booming energy economy.) Increasingly the bureaucrats in Washington are constricting public use of federally owned land. There’s a mountain of evidence that federal agencies badly mismanage the 700 million of acres of land under its control; in other cases, endless litigation from environmental groups prevent sensible active management of public lands. While private forest owners can clear dead and downed trees to reduce fire risk and promote forest health, federal forest managers are blocked at every turn from sensible forestry practices.

Once upon a time the land east of the Mississippi River was owned by the federal government, too, but the federal government devolved the land to the states after each state achieved statehood. The congressional enabling acts that created the individual states all contained language that called for the federal government to transfer title to the land from the federal government to the states. This is true right down to the 50th state, Hawaii, whose enabling law from Congress states that “the United States grants to the State of Hawaii, effective on its admission into the Union, the United States’ title to all the public lands and other public property within the boundaries of the State of Hawaii, title to which is held by the United States immediately prior to its admission into the Union.”

This process started with the Northwest Ordinance of 1787 that created the states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, and Wisconsin. The process of devolution of federal lands to new states began to stall out in the middle of the 19th century. For example, the federal government owned 90 percent of Missouri and Florida for decades after their admission to the Union as states.

When the federal government started dragging its feet, Midwestern states complained to Washington that the inability to tax or develop federally owned land constricted both the economies and public capacities of the states. Missouri’s legendary Senator Thomas Hart Benton (1872-1858) played a key role in breaking up the federal monopolization of land in the new states, because, he argued, “like all monopolies, [federal ownership] resulted in hardships to those upon whom it acted.” Sen. Benton was relentless in his hectoring of the federal government to dispose the land it owned in the states at the time, and today the federal government owns only 5 percent of Missouri.

The Federal Taylor Grazing Act of 1934—one of the laws which has snared Cliven Bundy—provided for federal management of rangeland “*pending its final disposal*” to the states. But in 1976 a very liberal Congress (that was back when Democrats enjoyed a two-thirds majority in both houses) decided, in the Federal Land Policy and Management Act, that the federal government would retain ownership of the land it held in the various states. This has crimped the fiscal outlook of many states, as state-owned lands are often managed explicitly to support public schools or other public purposes—not to mention the massive mineral and energy resources that are currently locked up on western federal lands. Hardly anyone is aware that since the 1976 act the federal government has made payments to the states (and especially rural counties) in lieu of the tax revenue or other economic benefit they lost by not having the land transferred to them. Essentially the federal government is paying western states not to use the land within their borders—a fiscal practice that is likely unsustainable in the long term.

Today the role of Thomas Hart Benton is being played by Utah State Representative Ken Ivory (R-Sandy), who has successfully urged several western state legislatures to pass resolutions asking the federal government to turn over land to the states. Some states are threatening to sue the federal government to expedite the process—likely a long shot, but the fervor of some western states behind the idea shows that the “Sagebrush rebellion” was alive and kicking long before the Bundy episode put it back on the front pages. Ivory has started the American Lands Council to help organize the effort across states.

The federal government and its client interests—mostly environmental ideologues—have evinced a steadily growing hostility to residents of the west. But even in the absence of bad policy, devolution of land to the states or, better still, to private owners is a matter of republican principle: a self-governing people need to own and control the land precisely in order to be self-governing in the fullest sense of the term. Private or local control of land also tends toward inculcating responsibility—another key trait of self-government. It’s the surest means of preventing the next Bundy-style

EMERGENCY ORDER ISSUED TO PROTECT UTAH SWINE

Swine livestock shows to become “terminal” after May 5, 2014

(Salt Lake City) - The State Veterinarian’s Office issued an emergency order increasing restrictions on the showing and importation of swine in Utah in an effort to prevent the introduction or spread of the highly contagious livestock disease, Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus, or the PED virus. PEDv is not a threat to humans or other animal species.

The order changes the way swine are exhibited at fairs and livestock shows by requiring the shows to be “terminal.” Effective May 5, 2014, all county and state fairs as well as other showings such as junior livestock shows and exhibitions where pigs and hogs are displayed or sold shall be considered a “terminal” show. This means that students and others who intend to enter swine for judging will not be allowed to bring the animals back to the farm, and the swine must go directly to slaughter. The State Veterinarian’s Office also strongly recommends that all shows scheduled to occur before May 5, 2014 be held as a “terminal” show.

The emergency order also requires all hogs and pigs entering Utah to be inspected by a veterinarian, and have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) that contains the following language; “To the best of my knowledge, swine represented on this certificate have not, within the past 30 days, originated from premises known to be affected by Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus (PEDv) and have not been exposed to PEDv.” “PEDv is highly contagious, and therefore aggressive steps must be taken to protect Utah’s \$200 million pork industry,” said Assistant State Veterinarian, Dr. Warren Hess. “I also want our 4-H kids to be able to show their animals, however this order requires that they not take their animals back home.”

“This order does not cancel any livestock show; it does put into place prudent measures intended to keep Utah one of a minority of states that is free of the PED virus. Utah only recently relaxed its ban on “terminal” swine shows, but because of the resurgence of PEDv in more than 30 states, including four of the five states bordering Utah (Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado, and Arizona), it has become necessary to reinstate these protections,” Dr. Hess added.

The Utah Department of Agriculture and Food (UDAF) is taking this action following the announced requirement by the USDA that any case of PEDv and Swine Delta Coronavirus be reported nationally. In addition, the USDA is requiring the tracking of movements of pigs, vehicles, and other equipment leaving affected premises; however, movements would still be allowed.

Since June 2013 as many as 7 million pigs have died in the United States due to the virus. PEDv was first diagnosed in Ohio last May and has spread within a year to 30 states with no reliable cure in sight, according to the USDA. Many states are increasing their regulatory precautions relating to swine livestock shows.

Important things to consider in an emergency family plan:

Your family may not be together when disaster strikes, so it is important to plan in advance: how you will contact one another; how you will get back together; and what you will do in different situations.

Contacts:

It may be easier to make a long-distance phone call than to call across town, so an out-of-town contact may be in a better position to communicate among separated family members. Ask an out-of-state friend to be your family out of town contact. After a disaster, it is often easier to call long distance. Be sure every member of your family knows the phone number and has coins or a prepaid phone card to call the emergency contact. You may have trouble getting through, or the telephone system may be down altogether, but be patient.

Other Plans in Place:

Find out what disaster plans are in place at your work, your children's school and other places your family spends time. Discuss preparedness with your family. Make sure you all understand what types of disasters can occur and what you will do in each case.

Escape routes:

Determine two escape routes from each room in your home

Meeting Places:

Pick three places to meet: in case of a sudden emergency, like a fire. Decide a location in your neighborhood and lastly, a regional meeting place in case you can't return home.

Children:

Teach children how and when to call 9-1-1 and other emergency numbers including fire, police, ambulance, etc. Post these numbers near phones in your home.

Fire Safety:

Install smoke detectors on each level of your home, especially near bedrooms and make sure everyone knows where the fire extinguisher is and how to use it.

First-Aid:

Learn basic first aid skills, including CPR.

Insurance:

Make sure your family has adequate insurance.

The annual Flaming Gorge Fish Derby sponsored by Lucerne Valley Marina was held May 17th & 18th with 346 – 3 person teams. This is the largest Derby held in Utah and ranks in the top 10 nationwide for freshwater fishing. Over \$62,000 in cash and prizes were given out over the two day event including two Polaris 570 Sportsman 4 Wheelers, a Merc trolling motor, Honda generators, camping and fishing gear. A big thanks goes to all the businesses who sponsored the event as well as the Derby participants. Adam Eakle of KSL Outdoors emceed the awards ceremony held on Sunday the 18th. All contestants were fed by the Lucerne Lakeside Grill. Weigh in stations were located at Lucerne, Buckboard and Cedar Springs Marina. The Flaming Gorge Fish Derby's final results are shown on page 23.

This year marked a first year that Lake Trout were measured and not weighed. Ryan Mosely of the Utah Division of Wildlife stated, "Although trophy lake trout are frequently caught in Flaming Gorge Reservoir, they are a resource that anglers want to protect. Using some eastern Northern Pike and Muskie fishing tournaments as an example, the Flaming Gorge Fish Derby made some significant changes to the lake trout category for their annual fishing tournament in 2014. Working with Wyoming Game and Fish and Utah Division of Wildlife Resources, the lake trout category was revised to include the addition of cell phone technology. Currently, there are more cell phones in the United State than there are citizens, and many of these have high resolution cameras built into them. People send or upload pictures all the time. Depending on the situation, this technology can even be used for a fishing tournament, so a trophy fish can be submitted and immediately released.

This year the lake trout category was based on length, not weight, and participants were able to enter just one fish per category. Upon catching a lake trout during the tournament, the participant could enter the fish by laying it on a custom Derby measuring board, placing a colored poker chip on top of the fish (given out prior to the derby start), and taking a quality cell phone photo with the length of the fish visible. While the fish was being released and swimming away, the photo was texted to the derby official and officially entered upon text confirmation.

Although it was not all easy, being there are limitations with cell service, phone resolution, etc., this tournament change will help reduce the unnecessary harvest and waste of trophy lake trout in Flaming Gorge Reservoir so organizers can continue to hold these events in the future." Robb Keith of Wyoming Game and Fish explained the new rules and answered questions all day on Friday the 16th of May during registration.

The Flaming Gorge Fish Derby is an annual event that started in 1984 and has grown each year. Lucerne Valley Marina began hosting this event three years ago and is now permitted by the Ashley National Forest for up to 400 teams. For more information please visit www.flaminggorgefishderby.com.


