

Commissioner's Corner

Among many other things, Daggett County will be entering a very important public lands planning process. This process has been initiated due to the passage of Utah House of Representatives Bill 323. This bill:

- requires a county to develop a resource management plan as a part of the county's general plan;
- establishes content requirements for a county's resource management plan;
- requires the state to provide information and technical assistance to a county;
- requires a county planning commission to coordinate with other counties;
- establishes a county's general plan as a basis for coordinating with the federal government;
- establishes administrative duties of the Public Lands Policy Coordinating Office with regard to county resource management plans;

An associated bill provides for up to a \$50,000 reimbursement from the State to each county to defray costs associated with developing these plans. We are requesting through UBAG (Uintah Basin Association of Counties) up to another \$100,000 be made available to Daggett County, through the use of CIB (Community Impact Board) Mineral Lease Fund.

This planning effort will need to be accomplished by the beginning of 2016. The content requirement for public lands established by the bill is much more detailed than previous planning efforts within Daggett County. The Daggett County Public Lands Advisory Committee and the Daggett County Planning and Zoning (Land Use Authority) Commission will be very busy with meeting this deadline.

Public participation in this effort is critical for a successful planning effort. All of the work accomplished during the preparation for the Daggett County Public Lands Initiative Resolution has been a tremendous precursor to the County Resource Management Plan development. We need and invite all input and involvement from the public. Remember, you are Daggett County.

eBlast News briefs from Utah NRCS



USDA StrikeForce Initiative in Utah

Last year, Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack launched the StrikeForce Initiative, a cross-agency effort to accelerate assistance to Historically Underserved groups. Through this initiative, USDA is working to ensure all producers have access to programs that can help them thrive, including proven conservation programs.

The StrikeForce initiative is designed to better serve persistent poverty communities and socially disadvantaged farmers through the coordination of activities among USDA agencies and the use of Community Based Organizations (CBO). The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Utah has identified 5 Counties as high priority areas for which it will focus its efforts.

Iron, Juab, San Juan, Tooele, and Uintah Counties are high priority areas for the StrikeForce Initiative in Utah.

Applications submitted by **July 17, 2015** will be evaluated to be considered for funding in fiscal year 2015. Applications received after that date will be accepted and evaluated for future rounds of funding.

Starting a practice prior to written contract approval will result in the ineligibility of that practice for EQIP assistance unless a waiver has been approved.

EQIP is open to all eligible agricultural producers without discrimination or bias.






He was preceded in death by his parents, brother, Redgy, and two brother-in-laws, Bill Anderson Jr., and Allen Caldwell.



Grilled Cheddar Burgers and Veggies Packs

Ingredients

ALSO CALLED **HOBO'S!**

- 1 pound lean ground beef
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese (4 ounces)
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 2 medium green onions, chopped (2 tablespoons)
- 1 teaspoon peppered seasoned salt
- 2 medium yellow Yukon potatoes, thinly sliced
- 1 1/2 cups baby-cut carrots
- 12 cherry tomatoes, cut in half, if desired
- 4 medium green onions, sliced (1/4 cup)
- 1/2 teaspoon peppered seasoned salt



Prep Time 20 min - Total Time 40 min - 4 Servings

Directions

- Heat coals or gas grill for direct heat. Spray half of one side of four 18x12-inch sheets of heavy-duty aluminum foil with cooking spray.
- Mix beef, cheese, Worcestershire sauce, 2 chopped onions and 1 teaspoon seasoned salt. Shape mixture into 4 patties, about 1 inch thick.
- Place potatoes on sprayed sides of foil sheets. Top with beef patty, carrots, tomatoes and sliced onions; sprinkle with 1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt. Fold foil over patties and vegetables so edges meet. Seal edges, making tight 1/2-inch fold; fold again. Allow space on sides for circulation and expansion.
- Cover and grill packets 4 to 6 inches from medium heat 17 to 20 minutes or until potatoes are tender.
- Place packets on plates. Cut a large X across top of packet; fold back foil.

Independence Day

Variously known as the Fourth of July and Independence Day, July 4th has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1941, but the tradition of Independence Day celebrations goes back to the 18th century and the American Revolution (1775-83). In June 1776, representatives of the 13 colonies then fighting in the revolutionary struggle weighed a resolution that would declare their independence from Great Britain. On July 2nd, the Continental Congress voted in favor of independence, and two days later its delegates adopted the Declaration of Independence, a historic document drafted by Thomas Jefferson. From 1776 until the present day, July 4th has been celebrated as the birth of American independence, with typical festivities ranging from fireworks, parades and concerts to more casual family gatherings and barbecues. When the initial battles in the Revolutionary War broke out in April 1775, few colonists desired complete independence from Great Britain, and those who did were considered radical. By the middle of the following year, however, many more colonists had come to favor independence, thanks to growing hostility against Britain and the spread of revolutionary sentiments such as those expressed in Thomas Paine’s bestselling pamphlet “Common Sense,” published in early 1776. On June 7, when the Continental Congress met at the Pennsylvania State House (later Independence Hall) in Philadelphia, the Virginia delegate Richard Henry Lee introduced a motion calling for the colonies’ independence. Amid heated debate, Congress postponed the vote on Lee’s resolution, but appointed a five-man committee-including Thomas Jefferson of Virginia, John Adams of Massachusetts, Roger Sherman of Connecticut, Benjamin Franklin of Pennsylvania and Robert R. Livingston of New York-to draft a formal statement justifying the break with Great Britain.

Early Fourth of July Celebrations

In the pre-Revolutionary years, colonists had held annual celebrations of the king’s birthday, which traditionally included the ringing of bells, bonfires, processions and speechmaking. By contrast, during the summer of 1776 some colonists celebrated the birth of independence by holding mock funerals for King George III, as a way of symbolizing the end of the monarchy’s hold on America and the triumph of liberty. Festivities including concerts, bonfires, parades and the firing of cannons and muskets usually accompanied the first public readings of the Declaration of Independence, beginning immediately after its adoption. Philadelphia held the first annual commemoration of independence on July 4, 1777, while Congress was still occupied with the ongoing war. George Washington issued double rations of rum to all his soldiers to mark the anniversary of independence in 1778, and in 1781, several months before the key American victory at Yorktown, Massachusetts became the first state to make July 4th an official state holiday.

After the Revolutionary War, Americans continued to commemorate Independence Day every year, in celebrations that allowed the new nation’s emerging political leaders to address citizens and create a feeling of unity. By the last decade of the 18th century, the two major political parties-Federalists and Democratic-Republicans-that had arisen began holding separate Independence Day celebrations in many large cities.

July 4th Becomes a National Holiday

The tradition of patriotic celebration became even more widespread after the War of 1812, in which the United States again faced Great Britain. In 1870, the U.S. Congress made July 4th a federal holiday; in 1941, the provision was expanded to grant a paid holiday to all federal employees. Over the years, the political importance of the holiday would decline, but Independence Day remained an important national holiday and a symbol of patriotism.

Falling in mid-summer, the Fourth of July has since the late 19th century become a major focus of leisure activities and a common occasion for family get-togethers, often involving fireworks and outdoor barbecues. The most common symbol of the holiday is the American flag, and a common musical accompaniment is “The Star-Spangled Banner,” the national anthem of the United States.
