

BURL POTTER ~ LOCAL 'BOY' INDUCTED INTO COWBOY HALL OF FAME



Burl Potter was born in 1921 in Linwood, Utah, the 4th of 13 siblings. He went to a one room schoolhouse until the 8th grade. In 1933 at the age of 12, he had a job to change out the horses on the construction of a road, which used horse drawn equipment to do the work. As a young boy his father sent him to take a herd of sheep to summer pastures on the Uinta mountains. He remained with them through the summer living in a sheep camp and having only his horse and dog for company. He worked for several ranches south of Rock Springs as a ranch hand until 1956 when he moved his family to Daniel to work for Bob and Mildred Miller on the Flying V Ranch. There he moved cattle along the Green River Drift for summer pastures and then rounded them up in the fall to bring back to pasture. In later years Burl went to work for Buss Fear at Big Piney, Wyoming. After Fear Ranches were sold, he worked for Bill Barney until his retirement. Burl now lives in Arizona.

Commissioner's Corner



If you haven't read a newspaper or watched the news you may not be aware of the Greater Sage Grouse Decision that was announced on September 22nd by the Department of Interior's Sally Jewell. The announcement that was released stated that federal protection under the Endangered Species Act for the Greater Sage-Grouse are not warranted. This normally would seem like good news; however, the bad news is the federal management plan that accompanies this announcement.

Gov. Gary R. Herbert issued a statement regarding the greater sage-grouse announcement saying, "I am deeply concerned with the decisions of the Departments of Interior and Agriculture which constitute a significant overreach by federal government on this issue. The state of Utah has implemented a successful sage-grouse conservation plan that has been rejected by the federal government, jeopardizing conservation of the species and reasonable economic growth in Utah."

The Governor went on to state, "I have always believed that, as a state, Utah is better positioned to manage our sage-grouse population than the federal government. Utah has in fact adopted a strong conservation plan designed to protect, enhance and restore sage-grouse habitats throughout the state. This effort by Utah has resulted in the restoration of more than 500,000 acres of sage-grouse habitat and a significant growth in sage-grouse populations."

These kinds of overreaching actions by the federal government should concern all of us. If the Greater sage-grouse is not going to be listed as an endangered species, why are we going to be forced to manage habitat like they are. Greater sage-grouse populations are not in peril in Utah and we had a management plan in place that was working. How long will it take for the federal government to defund this program? How will this affect our grazing industry? In turn how will this affect our overall economy? These are questions we must all ask. We wonder what the federal government will put their hands in next to create more of an unfair advantage to Western Counties.

Ancient Origins of Halloween

Halloween's origins date back to the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain (pronounced sow-in). The Celts, who lived 2,000 years ago in the area that is now Ireland, the United Kingdom and northern France, celebrated their new year on November 1. This day marked the end of summer and the harvest and the beginning of the dark, cold winter, a time of year that was often associated with human death. Celts believed that on the night before the new year, the boundary between the worlds of the living and the dead became blurred. On the night of October 31 they celebrated Samhain, when it was believed that the ghosts of the dead returned to earth. In addition to causing trouble and damaging crops, Celts thought that the presence of the otherworldly spirits made it easier for the Druids, or Celtic priests, to make predictions about the future. For a people entirely dependent on the volatile natural world, these prophecies were an important source of comfort and direction during the long, dark winter.

Today's Halloween Traditions

The American Halloween tradition of "trick-or-treating" probably dates back to the early All Souls' Day parades in England. During the festivities, poor citizens would beg for food and families would give them pastries called "soul cakes" in return for their promise to pray for the family's dead relatives. The distribution of soul cakes was encouraged by the church as a way to replace the ancient practice of leaving food and wine for roaming spirits. The practice, which was referred to as "going a-souling" was eventually taken up by children who would visit the houses in their neighborhood and be given ale, food, and money.

The tradition of dressing in costume for Halloween has both European and Celtic roots. Hundreds of years ago,

winter was an uncertain and frightening time. Food supplies often ran low and, for the many people afraid of the dark, the short days of winter were full of constant worry. On Halloween, when it was believed that ghosts came back to the earthly world, people thought that they would encounter ghosts if they left their homes. To avoid being recognized by these ghosts, people would wear masks when they left their homes after dark so that the ghosts would mistake them for fellow spirits. On Halloween, to keep ghosts away from their houses, people would place bowls of food outside their homes to appease the ghosts and prevent them from attempting to enter.

Country Apple Dumplings

So Easy!! Who knew that fresh apples, crescent roll dough, and citrus soda could make such a wonderful treat!"

Ingredients

- 2 large Granny Smith apples, peeled and cored
- 2 (10 ounce) cans refrigerated crescent roll dough
- 1 cup butter
- 1 1/2 cups white sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 (12 fluid ounce) can or bottle Mountain Dew™

Directions:

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F . Grease a 9x13 inch baking dish. Cut each apple into 8 wedges and set aside. Separate the crescent roll dough into triangles. Roll each apple wedge in crescent roll dough starting at the smallest end. Pinch to seal and place in the baking dish. Melt butter in a small saucepan and stir in the sugar and cinnamon. Crock Pot Chile Verde

Ingredients

- 1 yellow onion, chopped
- 5 garlic cloves
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 lbs lean pork, cubed
- 2 -3 mild Anaheim chilies, seeded and sliced
- 1 jalapeno chile, seeded and sliced (or more, to taste)
- 8 large tomatillos, husk peeled and coarsely chopped
- 2 teaspoons oregano
- 2 teaspoons ground sage
- 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh cilantro
- 1 teaspoon dried chile powder
- 2 cups chicken stock
- 1/2 teaspoon salt (to taste)
- 1/4 teaspoon white pepper



Directions

1. Sauté the onion and garlic in olive oil.
2. When onion is soft, put it in the crock pot.
3. In the same pan you sautéed the onion and garlic in, add a little more oil, turn up the heat, and brown the cubed pork.
4. Put the pork and remaining ingredients in the crock pot.
5. Turn on medium and cook for at least 6 hours.
6. Enjoy!
