

There has been long-standing citizen involvement in the planning of Daggett County. Your Planning & Zoning (P&Z) board has lost 2 long term members, Stew Leith and Ryan Morgan. We thank them for their dedicated service.

Daggett County is looking for two volunteer board members. As a member on the Planning & Zoning Board it can positively impact the quality of life in your community, get involved with issues, projects, and programs. There is a lot going on this year and there has never been a better time to get involved!! Decisions and plans that are decided by the P&Z board can have an effect on property values. The P&Z Board meets only once a month so it is just a little of your time needed to make such a huge impact in your community! At this time the board is meeting at least twice a month with everything that is going on in the County. That is just temporary until the County Resource Management Plan (CRMP) is done and the codification of the County Ordinances is complete. Planning & Zoning provides citizens with an opportunity for involvement in advising the County Commissioners, and other decision-makers on development projects, general or community plan amendments, rezonings and public facilities. The recommendations of P&Z are integral components of the planning process, and are highly regarded by the County Commissioners. Planning & Zoning focuses on establishing a long-term vision for development of the community and reviewing development proposals for consistency with that vision. There has never been a more important time than now to get involved. Daggett County is required to prepare a County Resource Management Plan (CRMP) detailing the county's plans for the use, development, protection, and management of public resources within its boundaries. This CRMP will then be used to coordinate with federal agencies as they update their Federal Land Management Plans.

MANILA ELEMENTARY 1ST & 2ND SCIENCE FAIR



Alicia Stoll - Telephones

Alicia Stoll did her Science Fair Project on the evolution of telephones from the time Alexander G. Bell first invented them. She constructed a telephone made from cup and some string and had continued to test it out. Alicia concluded that from the time phones had first been introduced to now, the sound waves had altered throughout the years.



Sienna Gonder - Salt Crystals

Sienna Gonder did her Science Fair Project on Salt Crystals. When Sienna conducted her experiment, her hypothesis was that the crystal would take all of the color. When the experiment was over, the pipe cleaner had taken every bit of the color and the crystals came out clear. Sienna stated that she had a fun time doing this and she would love to do it again in the future.



Keaton Housley - Volcanoes

Keaton Housley tested which substance would make a better volcanic eruption. He used the following: Balsamic Vinegar, Apple Cider Vinegar, White Vinegar, Distilled Vinegar, and Red Wine Vinegar. All were mixed with baking soda. Each had a reaction, but all were different in its own way. The White Vinegar created the most foam, the Apple Cider Vinegar lasted the longest, and the Distilled Vinegar erupted the fastest.



Ethan Roundy - Creating Motion

Ethan Roundy conducted an experiment using a tub with dish soap, milk, and food coloring. When all of the substances were mixed together, they continued to move around all on their own. Ethan mentioned that he had a fun time watching all the colors swirl around.



Daxon Hullinger - Elephant Toothpaste

In Daxon's experiment, he mixed yeast and peroxide into a container. The yeast and the peroxide reacted and formed a thick, bubbly paste; in which the name "Elephant Toothpaste" originated. Daxon mentioned that he had seen this experiment done before and wanted to test it for himself.



Evan Wilson - The Egg Experiment

Evan Wilson used several hard-boiled eggs in an experiment to see what would happen if the eggs were soaked in different liquids. Most of the eggs were soaked in popular sodas, including Pepsi, Root beer, and Coca-Cola. Those eggs changed to the color of the soda. The other egg was soaked in vinegar. While the egg was being soaked in vinegar, the consistency had changed into a rubber-like state.



Jake Dupaix - Do I Need Sunscreen?

Jake Dupaix tested to see if in the heat he would really need sunscreen. He took a dark colored paper and applied sunscreen on certain parts of the paper. Jake let the paper sit in the sun for about 45 minutes. When the time was up, he concluded that without the sunscreen the paper had faded, but in the areas that had the sunscreen, the paper stayed its original color.



Gracie Pendleton - Just Like New

In Gracie Pendleton's experiment, she was curious to see if Coca-Cola would change the color and appearance of an ordinary penny. She let the pennies soak in the Coca-Cola overnight. When she saw the pennies in the morning, she said they had become "very sparkly" in her words. She also concluded that Coca-Cola turns things sparkly!



Kylee Thompson—Fireworks in a Jar

Kylee Thompson mixed water, oil, and food coloring in a bottle and mentioned that each bottle that each substance had different consistencies. Each bottle had their own color; therefore, creating different colors of "fireworks". As the interview was coming to an end, Kylee also mentioned that she had a great time doing this experiment and that she would love to do it again.



Makayla Barton - How to Make Water Glow

Makayla Barton cut a highlighter into a bottle of water. When the highlighter made contact with the water, the water glowed in the dark. Makayla also tested this with different colors of highlighters. She also used a backlight to show how much the highlighter made the water actually glow.



Taylor Rosenberger - Potato and a Light Bulb

Taylor had a very "bright" idea. She wanted to see if a potato could create electricity, enough to light a small light bulb. She connected a potato with copper wire, pennies, and screws. The potato had created electricity! Taylor was very excited to see that her experiment actually worked.



Colton Potter – Lava Lamps

Colton Potter did his Science Fair Project on Lava Lamps. In his experiment, he combined oil, water, food coloring, and Alka-Seltzer. When the Alka-Seltzer was put into the water, it began to dissolve and create bubbles. Since the water and the oil do not mix, the bubbles pushed the colored water into the oil creating a lava lamp effect.



Addi Potter - Blow it Up

Addi Potter did a twist on a classic. Addi inserted baking soda into a deflated balloon and an empty bottle full of vinegar. She then had connected the top of the balloon to the top of the bottle. She continued to tip the balloon upwards so that the baking soda would mix with the vinegar. Once the two substances combined, the gas created from the reaction inflated the balloon!



Cooper Olson - The Toothy Egg Experiment

Cooper Olson used four eggs and submerged them in four different liquids. These liquids included coffee, tea, Pepsi, and Root Beer. Cooper left the eggs in each liquid for two whole days. When he took the eggs out, the egg shells turned to the color of each of the liquids. Cooper concluded that the discoloring on egg shells have the same effect as on teeth!



Kylin Blea - Diet Coke and Mentos

During Kylin's project, she tested what effect Diet Coke had on Mento mints. She used two bottles of Diet coke and inserted the Mentos and closed the cap. In her first attempt, it worked just as planned. Although, during her second attempt, she used more Mentos than the first try. The Diet Coke exploded much more than her first time. Kylin mentioned that she loved doing this project.






Perennial Pepper weed

Background: Native to southern Europe and western Asia, perennial pepper weed is commonly found in wet drainage areas of waste areas, ditches, and crop lands.

Other Common Names: Tall Whitetop and Broadleaved Peppergrass.

Description: Perennial pepperweed grows from 1-6 feet high. It has spreading lateral rootstocks. Leaves have smooth to lightly toothed margins. Stems and Leaves are waxy. White flowers form dense clusters at the end of branches. Flowering takes place from summer to early fall.



Horay Cress


Background: This plant originated in Europe. It reproduces by root segments and seed. IT is commonly found on disturbed sites along road ways, field edges and excavations. It is also widespread weed of grain fields, cultivated fields and meadows. It grows particularly well on somewhat salinic soils.

Other Common Names: Small Whitetop, Whitetop.

Description: Horay cress is a perennial plant. Commonly 1-2 feet tall, with creeping rootstocks. Leaves are finely toothed. Upper leaves clasp the stem. Bloom is the late spring with clusters of white flowers, each flower containing 4 petals. Seed pods are heart shaped and contain 2 brownish seeds.

**Control of these weeds is needed. Early detection and control can be done by the Daggett County Weed Department. Minimum Fee.


